About Inspired Learning

Some teachers are providing live virtual learning sessions. Others are recording themselves for children to learn on their own time. In any case, your ultimate goal is to inspire children to learn. As they begin to think more deeply, children connect concepts and understand the world in new ways. You can help children experience the joy of aha moments through intentional interactions that build language and strengthen thinking. Even through virtual support, you can inspire children to have a love for learning.

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CLASS Focus



Concept Development

Your use of instructional discussions and activities to promote students' higher-order thinking skills. Moreover, your focus on understanding rather than rote instruction.



Quality of Feedback

The degree to which you provide feedback that expands learning and understanding and encourages participation.



Language Modeling

The quality and amount of your use of language-stimulation and language-facilitation techniques.

Planning to Inspire Learning in a Virtual Setting

In virtual settings, children benefit from different groupings and frequencies for their sessions with you. Start planning how you can effectively introduce complex ideas to explore, support children's extended thinking, and inspire them to learn.



Providing Frequent Opportunities to Build Skills

Every virtual session is a chance to help children build their thinking and language skills. Plan for a variety of structures—large group, small group, individual—so that children have frequent and equal access to activities.

Some Suggestions	Your Idea(s)
1 Schedule brief, focused one-on-one sessions.	
2 Provide ways for children to be involved even if they miss live online sessions.	
3 Think deeply in frequent small groups; have fun in occasional big groups.	



Building Concepts, Connections, and Understanding

For children, exploring how concepts and experiences are related is part of gaining knowledge and developing language skills. Make the most of virtual sessions by helping children connect learning with their lives.

Some Suggestions

1 Encourage children to explain how a lesson relates to their personal experience.
2 Include resources available at home in activities and conversations.
3 Say what you see children doing while they are doing it.



Supporting Ideas and Efforts for Sustained Thinking

Sustained interactions can deepen children's thinking and motivate them to take on challenges. The most effective setting for sustained interactions is uninterrupted one-on-one time. Virtual learning provides this ideal setting.

1 Listen and respond to a child's questions and ideas about a

Out of Classroom Supports

Virtual learning is vital to ensuring that all children have opportunities to build important thinking skills. Alternative meeting times, recordings, and activities that don't require online access will allow busier family members to make sure their child is still getting the most out of your teaching. When you communicate developmentally appropriate learning goals and share simple strategies, you give families what they need to support their child at home. Communicate regularly with family members, affirming and appreciating their efforts as their child's first teachers. With your support, family members may even become inspired to learn more, too!

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Now that you've brainstormed some ways to inspire learning in your virtual classroom, choose an interaction goal to focus on during your next meeting with children.
